But then, life happened: jobs, kids, and immigration struggles which, my fellow graduates, I am sure many of you find familiar. For a long time, my dream of going back to college seemed like a distant memory.

After 13 years, my husband and I decided to move to the US because of the economic opportunities here. We, along with our two kids, came here on December 24th, 2012. And while we regarded that day as our own Christmas miracle, we couldn't stop ourselves from feeling all the conflicting emotions: fear, excitement, relief and...fear again.

A lot of that fear dissipated once I enrolled at NECC. Yes, I went back to college at 32, expecting to see in my classes peers that were much younger than me. Instead, I was pleasantly surprised to encounter people from all walks of life, and from all backgrounds, not only among the students but among the professors, advisors and

campus leadership as well. It was precisely this striking diversity that allowed me to feel accepted and supported in my dream of pursuing a college degree.

My fellow grads, I applaud you for your amazing achievement. Many of you had to face obstacles that might have seemed insurmountable, challenges such as poverty, problems with your immigration status, limited English proficiency, or lack of support. However, you all rose to the occasion, every single time, even if this sometimes meant studying after 9 pm (because that's when your kids went to sleep) until 2 o'clock in the morning, sleeping 4 hours, going to your full-time job and repeating this cycle the next day. You are the real heroes of this day and I feel honored and privileged to have known so many of you.

To my fellow Engineering Grads-Where are you, guys? I can't hear you! While it's well known that knowledge means power, I think that all of us in Engineering interpret power as current times voltage or, also, change in work over a period of time. Truth be told, folks in Engineering think in very concrete terms but I think we got it right this time! So, my advice to you is this: just like voltage, you need to put your hard work in and you'll reap the results-don't be concerned with how long it takes to be where you want to be. Engineers know the current will take you there, sooner or later, and this lesson is something all of today's graduates have learned.

I found this to be true in my case, when I came to the States. To be honest, I did not choose Engineering- Engineering chose me. I did not think much about it at that time-but after a while I became very interested in the field and, when I applied to NECC, I decided not to pursue my original major from my Romanian university and, instead, I enrolled in the

Technology and Engineering program. And, while there, an amazing thing happened-I decided to stick with it. Suddenly, I did not allow myself to find any excuse not to finish it- not the fact that I had a family; not the fact that I had a full-time job; not the economic constraints; and certainly, not the fact that I was in a new country whose language I had yet to master. And that's when I knew that Engineering was my call. Well, of course, all this might have been a bit different if Macy's had offered me that sales floor position...

You see, in life, sometimes you need to be open to what comes your way, embrace the unexpected and get ready to fight for dreams that might seem impossible. As the great Romanian historian and politician Nicolae lorga said: "Never say it can't be done but begin with "let's try." ("Nu spune niciodata nu se poate ci incepe cu sa vedem.")

Fellow grads, I am sure that all of us have someone who helped us get where we are today. As we are all thinking about those who have impacted our lives, I would like to take a moment to thank a few people whose tremendous support made me continue my academic journey, especially when thoughts of giving up would make me question my call.
